Kean Kavanagh

Portlaoise GAA has always been about more than just sport. It's a community, a home, a heartbeat for many. And few capture that spirit better than Kean Kavanagh.

A former underage footballer and hurler who wore the white and green with pride, Kean is now forging a path in the Irish and UK music scenes. With a string of well-received singles and an eagerly anticipated new album, The County Star, due out on 6 June, the Portlaoise native is making waves far beyond the county bounds.

We caught up with Kean to talk club memories, songwriting, and how growing up around Fr. Brown Avenue and Rathleague helped shape his journey, both on and off the pitch.

Kean is a singer, songwriter and producer. A founding member of the Soft Boy Records collective, he's known for blending genres and storytelling in a style that's distinctly his own. Before stepping onto music stages across Ireland and beyond, Kean spent his youth on the fields of Laois, lining out for Portlaoise in both football and hurling. He won county titles at U14, U16, Minor and U21 level, and remains a proud Town man through and through.



Tell us about the new album. What can people expect from it?

It's a bit of a story of this character, the County Star, who's a little bit me and a little bit an exaggeration of me I think. I would have been born in Texas where my parents had emigrated and we moved home to Portlaoise when me and my sister were very young, so there's a mixture of the reality of those actual stories of my life and growing up in Portlaoise and the fantasy of this far away place that influences the sound of the music.

How does it feel to be releasing new music this summer?

I'm buzzing. I've been working really hard the last year and a half in particular on all of this so it's really satisfying seeing it all come together and I'm getting really excited about starting the next album now!

You did a great version of the Christy Conroy classic *The Portlaoise Queen*. Do you have many memories of this being sung after club victories?

Yeah, specifically the first time I and probably a lot of people my age would have heard it sung, which was after the Leinster final win in 2004 in Newbridge. The Doc Fitz was brought up after the cup was presented and sang his heart out; ambitious to sing a song with 5 verses to a pitch full of people, most of whom have never heard it. After releasing my version of the song, it was great to hear lots more stories from other people about their own personal lore with the song. My Da, who grew up a few houses away from the Doc on the Borris Road, told us a few stories of getting dragged downstairs in the middle of the night after the men had come back from the pub to hear Doc singing it, and Connie Conroy sent me a lovely message about hearing the song and his own memories of his father Christy singing it to him. All of these types of things are really important to me because it's a song about people from the town and it continues to connect people. It's really important that we cherish the stories and songs that we have because what else do we have of people after they're gone.

You've a deep connection to the club. What are your earliest memories of Portlaoise GAA?

Probably running around the hall of the old clubhouse with all our cousins and friends while the adults drank pints in the bar after a game. I loved that clubhouse and I loved being so close to the pitch, it took no time at all to walk up and hop the gate into the grounds so we were up there doing our own training all the time. Also eating packets of wine gums in the back of Mick Nerney's car as he was bringing us to a blitz every other weekend in the summer.

Your songs The Whistle and A Cowboy Song aren't just great tracks, they've also got brilliant videos. There's a strong nod to your roots too, with Portlaoise GAA featuring heavily in both. How important is it for you to reflect where you come from in your music and visuals? Well, the lyrics of the album are pretty direct about the GAA I suppose, this idea of the character of the "County Star", and in the song Father Brown's it's very literally set in that location, so I always knew that I wanted the videos to be done at home. We had a fairly specific idea for "A Cowboy Song" that it would feature my band playing on the field in O'Moore Park under the floodlights. I called Sonny Keogh a week before I came home to see if we could get a lend of a bag or two of jerseys; Sonny seen my London number and thought I was a scam caller, but once I got through to him he sorted us out big time with all the gear we

could need. Have to give a massive thank you to everyone who came through to play the part of the players and the supporters in the videos as well. One of the best things about filming at home was the amount of generosity we received from every single person we asked anything of; a lot of the film crew were from Dublin and just couldn't believe how generous everyone in Portlaoise was, from Sonny to Mick Ryan giving us the run of his pub on a Sunday morning to Laois GAA allowing us the use of O'Moore Park. Everyone wanted to help us which reaffirmed all the beliefs I had had about the community in Portlaoise.

Pa Campion is a great character. Is he based on anyone in particular, or is he a mix of a few familiar faces from around the Town?

There have definitely been a few Elvis lookalikes to grace the Town but there are these Elvis characters all over Ireland, although they're sadly probably a dying breed! The character tied together the Irish/American connection in the music really beautifully and I think we were able to tell a really good story with Pa; he's a man who's dedicated his club to a fault, and has sacrificed his family and quite possibly his life for it. There's pure comedy there but there's also a very real darkness and loneliness too.

You've plenty of silverware from your time in the white and green, Féile hurling and football in 2008, U16 football titles 2009 and 2010, Minor in 2011 and 2012, and U21 in 2013. Any standout moments from those days?

The Minor final in 2012 would be the big one I'd say; Mountmellick were our rivals since we were 12 years old and there was a healthy bit of hatred from both sides I think. We both really, really wanted to win that match, it was the most important thing in our lives and I remember being a little bit obsessed with it. There was something so special about winning the last real underage final you'll have with the team you grew up playing with, and to win with a goal in the last minute as well from Aaron Rafter was cinema. That's probably my last memory of the clubhouse in Father

Brown's as well, us all celebrating together there after the match. The end of an era in many ways.

Your dad (Niall) was club chairman for 7 years, from 1999 to 2005. What was it like growing up in a household so closely linked with the club?

I think that that was a really exciting time in the club's history and it's something I've been thinking about more recently - Portlaoise and Laois were really on the up and it felt we were up and down to Croke Park all the time: there was a spotlight on the club in a way and a fair bit of media interest all round. I was a waterboy for the senior team so I'd head out to a lot of the trainings and all the matches with my Da and got to see the inside of the dressing room before the matches: I remember being up in a function room in Dublin with my Da and the team the day before the All Ireland final in 2005. Everyone had on new Adidas runners that had been gifted to the team and the selectors; there was a bit of glamour about the whole thing, everyone seemed to be operating at a very high level, and looking back I think it was great to see that so young. I think seeing that level of success and approach to preparation highers your horizons a bit and makes you more ambitious whether it's in sport or whatever else.

Do you keep an eye on how the club is getting on nowadays and if so where would you like to see the club in the future?

I try to get to any matches that I can when I'm home. I loved seeing the Minors win the final last year, think it was the first time since it was our team back in 2012 so that was a long overdue one. I'm really excited, as everyone probably is, about the new plans for Rathleague; I think they look amazing and it's so needed in terms of there being a place that people involved with the club can go and meet and there being a centrepoint in the same way that the old clubhouse was, making it a place that people are excited to be heading out to. I think that the community effect of that will have a natural effect on the actual success of Portlaoise, here's hoping anyway.

If you could give a message to young Town players chasing their own dreams, whether in sport, music or anything else, what would it be?

Study the greats and play with confidence.

And finally... any chance of a future gig in Rathleague? That sounds perfect to me!

TOWN25 Update Presentation Night

There was a fantastic turnout for the development plans presentation in the Midlands Park Hotel on Bank Holiday Monday May $5^{\rm th}$, where members were provided with a meaningful update on plans to develop the clubs grounds in Rathleague.

The presentation night was a landmark moment for Portlaoise GAA, where club members finally got an idea of the scale and detail of what Rathleague will become in the next few years.

It is not just the construction of a state of the art clubhouse - it is the transformation of the entire site into a modern and top level sports campus.

Speakers on the night included Eamon Fennelly, who welcomed everyone and gave a quick synopsis of how things had progressed to this point.

Jason Lalor gave a talk on Town 25 - its genesis and signposted the timeline to completion from here.

Dermot Costelloe described the construction plans and gave technical detail of the development.

Gareth Keogh and Shane Keane gave an indication of running costs of the new build, while Philip Scully explained the plans to generate income to ensure the successful running of it.

As a club we are acutely aware that this development, exciting as it is for all members and supporters of the club, is borne out of awful tragedy.

The generosity of Maryse, Travis and the Fitzpatrick and Knight families is far beyond anything the club could ever have hoped for. As a club we fervently hope that the family get some comfort over time from this legacy project which serves to commemorate Eoin and Dylan, but which is also the most unbelievable contribution to Maryse's home club, home town and county.



Portlaoise GAA Club Moves to Next Phase of Redevelopment Project with Planning Application Submission

Portlaoise GAA Club is delighted to announce a major milestone in the redevelopment of its Rathleague facilities, with a planning application set to be submitted to Laois County Council this week. This marks the next phase of an exciting programme to improve the club's grounds, further strengthening its role as a hub for sporting and community life in Portlaoise.

The planning application includes the construction of a new clubhouse and indoor training facility, a viewing stand, as well as pitch and floodlight enhancements. This will provide high quality facilities for club members, players, and the wider Portlaoise community, from young athletes to lifelong supporters.

The plans were presented to club members at a meeting on Monday evening (5th May) and pending planning approval, work on-site is expected to commence later this year, with completion projected for Summer 2027. The appointment of contractors will support local employment during the construction phase.

The redevelopment of the club is supported by Travis and Maryse Knight (née Fitzpatrick) in commemoration of Maryse's beloved brother and nephew, Eoin and Dylan Fitzpatrick. The boys tragically lost their lives in a road traffic accident in Turkey in July 2023.

Eamon Fennelly and Dermot Costelloe, joint Chairperson of Portlaoise GAA Club, commented: "This is an important day for Portlaoise GAA, the Fitzpatrick family and for the entire community. The submission of our planning application is a testament to the incredible work that has already taken place at Rathleague and reflects our commitment to providing a top-class facility. Pending planning approval, this redevelopment would not only enhance our club's sporting infrastructure but also provide the town's young people with resources and facilities to help them reach their full potential. The redevelopment would represent a significant contribution to the sporting and social fabric of Portlaoise and we are incredibly grateful to Maryse and Travis whose support enables this."

Maryse and Travis Knight (née Fitzpatrick) also reflected on the importance of reaching this phase of the development: "It's been incredibly heartening to see the passion and commitment displayed by everyone involved in this project to date. It further demonstrates the sense of community and togetherness that has helped our family immeasurably over the past two years. It also reinforces our belief that this is the right way to honour Eoin and Dylan in a meaningful and enduring way."

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
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

Thanks to everyone who helped make the night such a success. Well done again to the players and management on a memorable season.





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












CHOOSING THE RIGHT HURLSIZE

The game of hurling and camogie has changed hugely over the past 20/30 years and adult players are now using hurls that are 3/4 inches shorter.

Most adult players would measure themselves by standing up straight with shoulders square. Then gripping the hurl at the top, just under the handle, the hurl would be just above/touching the ground.

Essentially the length of the hurl is the distance from their wrist bone to the ground.

In general this would be the maximum size hurl an adult player would use and many would even use a size smaller.

For underage players it is best to have the hurl an inch or two off the ground. Unlike adult players, they have not got the same wrist and arm strength relative to their height.

Therefore the measurement we take is from the wrist bone to the ankle bone.

If children are in between sizes it is always best to choose the smaller size.

It is crucial that young players have hurls that are light and short so that they can learn the skills of the game without developing bad habits.

We wouldn't expect the children to play football in boots that are 2 sizes too big, and it is just as important that they don't use burls that are 2 inches too long.

We spoke with Claire O'Gorman, Ed O'Dywer and Brian Devaney to get a better feel for what Club Aclaí.

What inspired you to introduce HYROX-style training to Portlaoise GAA Club?

It started with a shared desire to get fitter, reconnect, and do something positive within the club community. Whether it was two of us running laps on cold winter nights or a mother looking to give something back through fitness, the drive was the same: to create a space where people of all backgrounds could come together and move.

HYROX training stood out because it's accessible and adaptable. We were inspired by the energy around it and decided to develop our own version that suits all ages, fitness levels, and schedules. What began with a handful of people has grown into a proper movement. It helps build camaraderie, confidence, and connection across the club.

How do you tailor the training to suit different fitness levels and backgrounds?

Adaptability is central to how we structure every session. Whether it's strength training, sled pushes, or cardio intervals, each station allows participants to work at their own level. You can push a heavier sled, use lighter dumbbells, walk instead of run, or hop on a bike instead of hitting the track. Everyone trains together, but at their own pace.

It's not just about fitness. Even if someone is limited in movement, they can still be part of the group. That sense of inclusion really matters. The structure allows us to challenge ourselves individually, but return as a group, starting and finishing together no matter the pace.

What kind of outcomes do you hope participants achieve?

Our main aim is to build overall well-being, physically, mentally, and socially. For many, it's a chance to reclaim a bit of time for themselves in the middle of busy family and work lives. People are getting fitter and stronger, but just as importantly, they're reconnecting with others and with themselves.

We've seen people form mini training groups outside the sessions, take on personal goals like 5Ks or longer races, and rediscover their love of movement. Whether it's someone showing up for the

first time or someone who's been with us since the start, we want them to leave feeling better than when they arrived.

The buzz in the room, the laughs, the shared effort — those are the real markers of success. It's a great reminder that community fitness doesn't have to be about competition. It's about showing up, supporting each other, and moving forward together.

How does this differ from traditional GAA fitness training?

This isn't about drills, match fitness, or preparing for the weekend's game. It's general fitness with a strong social side, open to anyone whether you've ever played GAA or not. It suits those who might not feel comfortable joining a team setup, or who want something that fits around their life.

The exercises are simple and effective. You don't need to be an athlete to join in - you just need to show up and give it a go. That makes it a lot more inclusive, and we've seen the impact that accessibility has had.

What are your future goals and plans for the program?

Our motto is: "One Town, One Team, One Goal: Wellbeing" That guides everything we do. We want to keep expanding in a way that keeps that spirit alive. This includes developing leaders within the group, possibly spinning off into other areas like walking,

 $running, or \ cycling \ clubs. \ The \ idea \ is \ to \ help \ people \ grow, \ stay \ active, \ and \ feel \ supported.$

We're also looking at ways to track how this is impacting people and the club as a whole. We want to collect feedback and learn what's working, what's changing, and how we can do even better. Social nights, end-of-season events, and maybe even a community Hyrox fitness type of day are all part of the plan.


This has grown far beyond what any of us expected. And we're only getting going.

How can new members get involved, and what advice would you give someone trying it for the first time?

Joining is simple. You do need to be a **Full** club member, mainly for insurance reasons, but many people have joined Portlaoise GAA just to be part of this. There's no extra cost beyond the full membership.

All it takes is one message. Reach out to any of the organisers (Karen Monaghan <u>087 636 8712</u>, Claire O'Gorman <u>086 352 9806</u> or Ed O'Dwyer <u>087 653 6144</u>) or someone you know in the group and we'll add you to the WhatsApp list. We ask people to let us know before turning up so we can set up the right number of stations, but after that, you're in.

Our advice to anyone considering it? Just start. Don't overthink it. Go at your own pace. You'll be supported the second you walk through the door. Nobody's competing against anyone else. You're working for your own health, your own peace of mind, and we'll all be there alongside you.



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
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
